## Barnabas CRICK (1806-c. 1884)

1. **Barnabas CRICK**, son of Simon CRICK (c. 1769-c. 1857) and Ann BALDREY (c. 1773-c. 1858), was born on 22 Jun 1806 in Bressingham, Norfolk.¹ He was baptised on 21 May 1809 in Roydon, Norfolk.¹ He and **Mary POTTER** had marriage banns published on 30 Aug 1829 in Bressingham.² other dates read were 06.09.1829 and 13.09.1829. Barnabas married Mary POTTER on 13 Oct 1829 in Bressingham. The marriage was witnessed by George LEWIS and Maria LONG.³ He appeared in the in 1841 census in Bressingham: 30, agricultural labourer, living with parents Simon (65, linen weaver) and Ann (65), and siblings Emma (11) and Ambrose (10).⁴ He and **Elizabeth UPCRAFT** obtained a licence to marry on 20 Oct 1843 - groom's parish: Bressingham; bride's parish: Redgrave, Suffolk; parish of intended marriage: Bressingham. He married her on 23 Oct 1843 in Bressingham. The marriage was witnessed by George LEVERETT and William LOVELESS. The ceremony was conducted by Rev. B. H. BIDWELL.⁵ He appeared in the in 1851 census in South Lopham, Norfolk: 44, shop keeper, living with wife Elizabeth (50).⁶ He appeared in the in 1861 census at Wood Road in South Lopham: widower, 54, farmer of 28 acres employing 1 man, living with wife Elizabeth (60).⁶ On 27 Jan 1866 he was mentioned in a newspaper article -

On the 11th inst., at South Lopham, in this county, aged 68, Elizabeth, wife of Mr. Barnabas Crick, eldest daughter of the late Mr. Wm. Upcraft, farmer, Hinderclay, Suffolk

He appeared in the in 1871 census at Wood Road in South Lopham: widower, 63, retired, living with housekeeper Susan SCOTT (widow, 58) and visitor Mary WALLIS (widow, 74).8 He experienced 1873 Domesday in 1873. living in South Lopham, Norfolk; land area A.10 R.3 (4.35 hectares); rentable

value £17 15s. Barnabas appeared in the in 1881 census at Low Common in South Lopham: widower, 74, of independent means, living with housekeeper Susan SCOTT (widow, 58). He died c. 1884.

Mary POTTER was born c. 1799. She died c. 1833 in Bressingham. She was buried on 2 Apr 1833 in Bressingham. was living in South Lopham.

Elizabeth UPCRAFT, daughter of William UPCRAFT ( - ), was born c. 1801 in Hinderclay, Suffolk.
