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ANNUAL LETTER

Sinchow Fu Station

November 1923

Attention is called to paragraph 191 on page 52 of the Rules and Regulations of the Society (Part II, 1912 edition), which enacts that Annual Letters (dealing with the year ending SEPTEMBER 30) should be posted not later than NOVEMBER 30. Missionaries engaged in Literary Work are asked to give in tabular form a clear list of the translation and revision work, etc., (A) in which they have been occupied, (B) which they have completed during the year. Those who edit papers or magazines should state the fact.

Station Class  
Woman's School

It is only possible to hold these classes during certain months of the year. "Herbert Benson" & "Chinese New Year" the women cannot be spared from their homes. The membership this term, unfortunately, was small, but we have cause to thank God for the four (4) who came forward with the request for baptism. We look forward to the re-opening of these classes with greater hopes & expectations.

Guest Hall

"Tuesdays" are specially devoted to visiting amongst the "women" who gather together in the "Guest Hall." The meetings are most satisfactory, as regards numbers - but we need much prayer for the working of the "Holy Spirit" in their dense & darkened minds. They are taught to read & memorize short prayers & "Chorus of Hymns" - then a Gospel-Talk is given, from large colored pictures. These gatherings are homely & friendly & give splendid opportunities of meeting the better class people.

Sunday - Classes

These classes are held for both "Christian" & "heathen" women, after the Church Service, & are regularly & well attended.

Sunday - Schools

The Girls' Sunday School has been continued throughout the year. The Day School Teachers give, both regular & valuable help. The Boys' Sunday School has been re-opened in the face of many difficulties, & is a cause for much "thanks giving."

Ministerion

Is a most interesting side of the work, giving opportunity of telling out the "Glad news" to those who seldom, if ever, hear. Preparations are made for a few days town. Perhaps we are fortunate in striking a "Market Day" in a fair sized town, some 15 miles away. We find a good open space for an "open-air" meeting - a very soon the space is filled

with one living man of precious souls. Intense appears to be keen, but in many cases "curiosity is keen!" for perhaps many have never before seen a "foreigner". After the meeting we find a ready sale for the "Gospel" & how one fears that each one sold, will reveal a "living message from a living God" to each "Buyer". With God all things are possible.

Further afield we realize we truly are objects of "curiosity" & "interest". "Are they men or women" we constantly hear said, on every side. Children run away screaming or hide behind their parents for protection, to the dear old "God" overcome by curiosity; said teacher I invite you to tell me as for a "man or a woman", & when she knew I was a woman just like herself - her reply was intense. In village nearer to hand - the children are not afraid of us & follow us in crowds - & gather in front as we go along. I frequently remark "I feel like the Pied Piper of Hamelin".

Another time we visit some of the larger houses, & they are wonderful - there is one "main Entrance", but once inside you are met with a perfect maze of "turnings" on every side, leading into the various rooms occupied by the many different families, belonging to the one Clan. On one house we visited there were over four hundred (200) members of the one Clan, divided into three (3) sections, "rich", "middle class" & "poor" in this instance many of the latter, "servants" to the "rich" members. From house to house we go, gladly welcomed & entertained - although at times the busy people continue their work while they listen, - others with more leisure seek to entertain us, giving us tea to drink, then a bowl of "min" a kind of "macaroni" so long & so difficult to maneuver on our chop-sticks.

Here one sits on the small stool chopping vigorously away at the food for the "precious pig", until her attention is arrested by some thing on our message, there a girl is being headed for fainting her neck & back, a woman is engaged to cure her, & by her side is a shell of "sea-nut" oil, & with another shell vigorously dipped into the oil, scraped up & down the back, until the blood nearly flows. This being a favorite treatment for aches & pains, & is in the "face" pinching, resorted to, often on neck, people with dark red stains on face or neck, & tanus immediately, this is the cause. Here again a woman is employed in pulling out the "bystiches" & hairs just round the forehead, of a young girl, who is preparing for her marriage. Then again there are those who drink tea on "menage" & cannot spare us to leave them.

"Women's" tell us more is repeated over & over again. It is on just such occasions that our hearts are full of gratitude to all "Loving School" who so graciously help in supporting our "Women's School" for it is such women, we write to come for more teaching.

LIMCHOW-FU.

The City of Limchow Fu is strongly walled & being within fairly easy reach of a Port, is of strategic importance, & therefore constantly embroiled with political problems & warfare; within this year alone, having changed hands twice, causing much suffering & distress among the people, whose one desire is to be left in peace, being perfectly contented with their "filling" of the ground to the "fruit thereof" & their business life flourish in the light. But unfortunately here, as in other places - it is the few "leaders" seeking for position & gain, & selfishly pursuing the interests of those who should be their "task" who cause all this distress & suffering amongst the mass.

The following will give our friends at home some idea of the problems & difficulties with which our work is beset.

One fighting, begins the City gates are closed - walls fortified & all communication with the outside world cut off. "Refugees" with their "precious bundles of clothing" come into the Compound, we fly our "well-worn" & "well-torn" "union jack" which wonderfully comforts the hearts of the refugees, & for the time being all work at a standstill. Thus we are outside the City surrounded with "Soldiers" nother - & fighting - but wonderfully secure, because trusting in our "Whisper Captain" - his heart.

Once again things quieten down, we sally forth to find out how all have fared. We walk the length of one rather long street called "Market - St." & on nearly every door there was this notice pasted - "Lost - all" or "Lost - part".

We enter one home, & could we go but picture to you the wretched destruction we are met with - you like us would plead more concerned by to our "God of Justice" for these poor helpless Brothers & Sisters who have nowhere to go, & return to look to, for protection & justice. Not alone have their "precious pigs", poultry, rice, salt bedding, & clothing been stolen, & not alone have doors been forced through - but from wall to wall, leading from home to home - had great holes been made where the thieves have broken through to steal - & rattle, chaw - stork - lumps, & anything smashed". We return home with aching hearts for these people whom God has called us to "serve" & whom we have learnt to love.

Desertion One very sad evil resulting from "warfare" here, is the desertion of "New-born babies". In looking through my "diary notes" I read the following:

I "picked up" a "little baby" outside our Church. After in-  
 -vestigation found it belonged to a woman, a wife of one  
 of our soldiers, who had been called to another part of the  
 district to pursue his war; the woman wishing to follow  
 him, had deserted her child. A letter appealing for  
 support was sent to Hon. N.M.C. & in answer a Chinese  
 Christian woman has offered to take & adopt the little one.  
 Later we "picked up" a baby, newly-born, unwashed, blue  
 with cold & covered with dirt, another appeal was sent  
 to Hon. N.M.C. & this one also is provided for.  
 Later, another little one picked up - but after a few months  
 & just after the new "baptism" - little "Tan-Tan" (Grace)  
 was called to be with the "Friend of Little Children".  
 Another getting in as follows: - A "nice little" brought to us  
 by a very old woman who had walked some eight (8) miles.  
 The mother of the child, in fear, had run away from her  
 during the fighting, & by the way side had given birth  
 to her "Babe" & left it here. This old dame having  
 sustained the infant, being too poor to rear the child  
 left it there for over a day, hoping some one would take  
 it. None did, so having heard of us brought it here.  
 And now I turn over a few pages & find that since our  
 return from holiday - a little over a month - we have  
 found by "Seven" (7) more such little ones, but unable  
 to take them in. One was kept here placed outside our  
 Compound, & whose little face had been badly eaten by ants.  
 & a son taken by some members of a wealthy family, just to  
 be fed, & put that again - with the hope some one else would  
 pick it up, they themselves were afraid its face would always  
 be figured, & for this reason, not pleased to rear it.  
 They have advised that this would not be the case, if they were  
 willing to use ointments, we would give them  
 whether or no they have adopted this little one we have  
 not again heard.

Though there is that which tends to discourage & dis-  
 -appoint, there is more to brighten our hopes &  
 encourage greater expectation.  
 The reality of the people are so saddened, & we hope,  
 their faith in their "idols" "Witch doctors", & "priests".  
 In Shan-tai; that the wonderful story we have to tell  
 fact is to move willing ears & hungry hearts & they  
 are more pleased to spare the time to hear of One who  
 will help & pity them & comfort in their other forms of  
 doctors! the point to their "idols" & the broken doors."  
 the idols within" & broken walls etc.; & remind them of the  
 more they have wealth spent in sacrifices to the "Street gods"  
 seeking for peace for their streets, & in several instances on  
 either side of that street, the honest, athletic, despised, the people  
 "lonely" - "What is their power to help?" No. No & No! & many  
 need for
